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MAESSAGE FROM

Connect Network together builds safe communities for children, develops opportunities for improved education and builds resilient mothers of vulnerable children.

It is nine years since the formation of Connect Network. Probably the most motivating and inspiring words a friend ever gave me were these words of Prince Nicolo Machiavelli in 1513:

"It ought to be remembered that there is nothing more difficult to take in hand, more perilous to conduct, or more uncertain in its success, than to take the lead in the introduction of a new order of things. Because the innovator has for enemies all those who have done well under the old conditions, and lukewarm defenders in those who may do well under the new. This coolness arises partly from fear of the opponents, who have the laws on their side, and partly from the incredulity of men, who do not readily believe in new things until they have had a long experience of them."

Back in 2003-4, Connect Network was just an idea of a few people, a dream imagined of how the lives of children could be impacted if we all worked together. The first 10 organisations formed Connect Network in October 2004 and appointed a steering group to lead the

beginning stages of the network. These were the innovators, those who stepped into the unknown to co-create a network that would have the potential to allow organisations and churches to do more together than they could alone. By 2008-10 the network had grown to over 60 organisations and churches. We piloted the Quality Improvement System which has since become the network's flagship programme, strengthening members so that they could give a better quality of care to children. We started documenting our procedures and practices. New innovations in 2012-2013 saw the network develop an integrated plan of three main collaborative goals, which members are now focusing on together, that are aligned with the National Development Plan for South Africa. The funding environment has been tough, but thanks be to God, not one member has had to shut its doors to women and children at risk.

Following the biblical mandate to work together in unity, Connect members are showing that networking is the new order of addressing issues and creating solutions that work for mothers and their children.

Connect Network has had a busy year finalising the three year Strategic Plan in collaboration with our 115 member organisations and churches. Through these members over 40, 000 women and 260,000 children at risk are being served. All members are following a collective strategy, working towards the same vision of seeing "Thriving Families, Transformed Communities."

In November last year Connect Network were heavily involved in changes that would have potentially affected the NPO sector in South Africa. The Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) put forward a proposal to revise the Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment (B-BBEE) Codes of Good Practice. This would have meant that funding to the Sector would have dramatically changed for the negative. Connect Network wrote a submission to the DTI and we lobbied

nearly 60 members and partners of the Network to endorse this submission. As a result, the DTI withdrew the proposal and the changes.

This past year I have had the pleasure of watching Connect Network raise the bar for ourselves and for our members. While the environment for non-profit organisations remains challenging, I have seen our community come together and show resilience, determination and a shared sense of purpose, working effectively as a unified voice for change in the plight of women and children. Our staff has worked tirelessly and conscientiously with our member organisations to implement the goals of providing education opportunities for children, keeping children safe and empowering and supporting women.

2012-13 Achievements

This year, Connect Network members improved the safety of the environments that children live in, throughout the Western Cape. Some specific achievements included:

- 10 member organisations took part in the abandoned children focus group, working to document their best practice models starting with the intake process for children into places of safety.
- SuperClubs were run in five sites with 667 kids in total and 55 volunteers from many churches and organisations over the December school holidays.

2012-13 Achievements (con't)

- During Child Protection month, churches and member organisations showed their commitment to strengthen the response to child protection. Seven churches held services to pray for children at risk, 45 people attended the Children's Act Legislation training day, and around 10 member organisations were involved in raising awareness to the public through 'going green' and handing out green ribbons.
- 76 people from 34 member organisations were trained in First Aid; over 5000 children now have access to trained first aiders and first aid kits.
- Let Your Light Shine training taught 12 member organisation leaders how to use training materials on HIV management in grassroots communities.



Shafick's Story

Shafick is an extremely shy 17 year old who lives in an informal settlement in Lansdowne. He dropped out of school two years ago because he was battling with reading and the much younger pupils in his class made fun of him. Shafick has very low self esteem and started attending the Homework Clubs run by the Lansdowne Ecumenical Group of churches, just to hang out. We soon realised that he was good with numbers and a great artist and we were able to harness his skills in assisting the smaller learners.

He started reading classes at the library once a week but soon found reading English as a challenge when his home language is Afrikaans. The Homework Club facilitators are now trying to find someone to assist him with Afrikaans reading. He has grown so much over the past year that he was appointed a leadership role at the December SuperClub. The children attending respect him and Shafick is showing great potential. One afternoon the SuperClub leaders forgot to collect the name tags from the children. The next morning Shafick arrived with all the name tags. Showing great initiative, he had gone from shack to shack collecting the tags as he knew the children would forget to bring them the next day. Asked how he felt about being a leader at a debrief, he said, "I never thought that anyone would ever listen to me when I spoke, but they do! I'm very proud!"

NETWORKING FOR EDUCATION



Developing opportunities for improved education for children

IN 2012-13, CONNECT NETWORK ANEANBERS RAN 22 HOANEWORK CLUBS ACROSS THE CITY, WITH TUTORS VOLUNTEERING THEIR TIANE AND SKILLS TO HELP CHILDREN LEARN BASIC LITERACY AND NUMERACY AND DO THEIR HOANEWORK IN A QUIET AND SAFE ENVIRONMENT.

The South African schooling system is in crisis, and those that suffer the most from the lack of educational opportunities are those living in poverty. Connect Network members are committed to providing learners with opportunities for additional educational support, helping children to get the assistance they need to stay in school, excel at their studies and progress to secondary and tertiary institutions. As a network, members provide tutoring and training to children in Homework Clubs, and support member Early Childhood Development (ECD) Centres to register their programmes and run them more effectively.

2012-13 Achievements

This year, Connect Network members significantly improved the educational opportunities for children throughout the Western Cape. Some specific achievements included:

- Connect Network members ran 22 Homework Clubs across the city, with tutors volunteering their time and skills as they help children learn basic literacy and numeracy and do their homework in a quiet and safe environment.
- To improve the impact of the support that these 800 children receive, we facilitated two Open Schools Worldwide trainings to equip 45 tutor facilitators with improved literacy and numeracy teaching tools.
- Connect Network partnered with other organisations to mobilise resources for 34 member organisations, including 19 computers from the University of Cape Town and 16 sets of study aids from The Answer Series.
- Ernst and Young provided lapdesks and the Reichardts, who visited in February 2013, provided small grants to some organisations and an age-appropriate copy of The Long Walk to Freedom to

each Homework Club in the network.

Incline Marketing Solutions, in consultation with Connect Network, launched Incline Academy, with the aim of assisting learners who did not most university.

ing learners who did not meet university entrance requirements due to low mathematics marks, improve their grades and increase their chances of acceptance into a tertiary institution.

- Research was conducted on the state of Early Childhood Development centres in the network that showed evidence of 10,616 children being served by 154 ECD centres clustered and represented by 13 ECD members. This research enabled the network to actively engage with the Department of Social Development on the current issues that these ECD centres are facing.
- Two network staff joined the co-ordination to focus specifically on working with the network to achieve the education goals.

NETWORKING FOR WONNEM



Empowering mothers of vulnerable children to develop resourceful and resilient women

Mothers who are at risk of crime, abuse, sexual exploitation, crisis pregnancy, substance abuse, HIV or poverty also have children at risk. Connect Network works to empower these mothers with the knowledge, skills, and support they need to better take care of themselves and their children. Specifically, our members focus on supporting teen mothers, running

crisis pregnancy centres, preventing and supporting survivors of violence against women, amongst other initiatives. Connect Network also focuses on equipping the caregivers themselves with training and support to be able to help other women in their communities through their Equipped to Serve training.



IN 2012-13, 37 STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS FROM SIX CONNECT NETWORK MEMBER ORGANISATIONS WERE TRAINED IN THE EQUIPPED TO SERVE VOLUNTEER COUNSELLING PROGRAMME TO PROVIDE CRISIS COUNSELLING, WHICH STRENGTHENED THE NETWORK'S BASE OF CRISIS COUNSELLORS FOR WOMEN.

2012-13 Achievements

Connect Network members spent 2012-13 • building relationships and strengthening their programming for mothers of vulnerable children. Specific achievements included:

- Site visits to key members by community networkers to assess needs, support and build relationships with and between members to engage them in active networking to benefit women.
- A DVD version of the Equipped to Serve training course was provided for 18 volunteers, hosted by Living Hope.
- Focus Groups were held with five Crisis
 Pregnancy Centres to jointly develop
 locally relevant brochures on adoption
 and other pregnancy-related issues.
- A women-focused meeting was held with 21 participants from 11 member organisations to share ideas, learn from each other, to pray and support one another. Together they built an asset map of all women-focused organisations and agreed on joint plans and goals.

37 staff and volunteers from six member organisations were trained in crisis counselling, using the Equipped to Serve training programme, which strengthened the Network's base of crisis counsellors for women.



Equipped to Serve

Long-standing member organisation, Village Care Centre (VCC), have seen the Equipped To Serve (ETS) course their staff attended have a dramatic effect on the way they counsel their school-going clients. Mary Lottriet, Director of the Centre, said that previously VCC was ill equipped to counsel and advise the young girls visiting the centre. Then two things happened to change that scenario. Mary's teenage daughter fell pregnant, and Mary attended an ETS crisis counselling course. According to Mary, that course equipped her to support her daughter while addressing her home situation and also to introduce the ETS counselling method at the Centre. The course has yielded positive results and many young people have been assisted in making wise decisions regarding their situations.

NETWORKING FOR CAPACITY



STRENGTHENING THE CAPACITY OF MEMBER ORGANISATIONS

Quality Improvement System (QIS)

To strengthen the systems, structures and processes of Connect Network members, we use the Quality Improvement System (QIS) organisational capacity building tool. QIS provides biblical principles and international best practice standards in six module areas: Project Planning & Design, Governance, Financial Accountability, People Care, Child Protection and Child Wellbeing. By strengthening our members' systems, structures and processes, they can ultimately improve the quality of care they provide to children.

IN 2012-13, SIX CONNECT NETWORK MEMBER ORGANISATIONS COMPLETED THE QIS TRAINING CYCLE.

After completing the 'Project Planning and Design' QIS module, the Arise team undertook a review all of our plans and activities to ensure that we have clear, measurable, and objective goals for each programme we run. We recently ran our very first Personal Development Workshop for adults in Heideveld as a result of planning according to stakeholder input (another lesson from QIS!). Our workshop was planned in line with the tools we received at QIS and measured according to our new Monitoring and Evaluation strategy. As a result, 100% of the attendees reported reaching the personal development goals that we had set out to achieve! Thank you to Connect Network and the QIS team for the impact you've had here in Heideveld!



2012-13 Achievements



2011/12: R1,364,193




2012-13 FINANCIALS
