

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The past six years with Connect Network [two as a board member and four as board chair] have been challenging and exciting for me and I am immensely grateful for this privilege.

I was drawn to accept the invitation to serve with Connect largely because of its strong commitment to make a difference through networking and collaboration - esteemed values in any organisation.

Connect provides a platform, via skills and expertise, to build an active and engaged membership of autonomous organisations who work together towards a shared or common goal i.e. of changing the plight of Women and Children at Risk in greater Cape Town. By recognising that networking and collaboration is a process (not an end) Connect patiently and steadily facilitates processes to build relationships, trust and commitment, and helps to build consensus towards a commonly owned vision by welcoming wide participation on decision-making. The board and our network (NPC) members personally thank each one of you for your willingness and commitment to go the extra mile.

To the network affiliates: You are the hands and feet of transformation in the community, and your willingness to collaborate towards a transformed Cape Town is an inspiration. Stay involved and remember you are the network.

DIRECTOR'S OPERATIONAL REVIEW





Monthly prayer breakfasts [hosted at Beautiful Gate] are informal networking and prayer [for children at risk] gatherings. On average 15-30 people attend every month. Various network affiliates lead the prayer time, giving sufficient opportunity for active participation. Attendance is varied, but for the most part it has been staff of affiliate organisations, with a few leaders attending as well. These gatherings lend themselves to closer networking and one affiliate has even used these occasions as part of their staff-wellness plan. The informal nature of our gatherings has encouraged new connections and contact meetings.




@child_protection_campaign

2014 was the sixth year of Connect's Child Protection Campaign. As a build-up towards the campaign 20 people rode the Argus Cycle Tour in the 'Ride for Hope' team with Hope Prison Ministries. Throughout the month of May Connect promoted 'Child Protection' through our joint campaign. A few of our network affiliates also co-ordinated their own local campaigns, and one network event saw 25 affiliates coming together to focus on child protection. A church service of 'Hope and Blessing' was organised by four such affiliates and was kindly hosted at Garden's Presbyterian Church at the end of May.

This enabled us to reach a wider audience in order to attract interest to the network. LinkedIn, Twitter and Instagram have been activated to enhance the public profile of Connect.

QUALITY IMPROVEMENT SYSTEM



This is the flagship programme of Connect Network as QIS plays a pivotal role in strengthening the affiliates' internal systems, structures and processes so that they function in

line with best practice, and to improve the quality of care offered to children and women at risk. QIS provides Biblical principles and international best practice standards in six module areas: Project Planning and Design, Governance, Financial Accountability, People Care, Child Protection and Child Wellbeing. The programme strengthens the bonds between our affiliates as these different organisations journey together towards Viva verification. They learn from one another, sharing important experiences and

resources together, and they form peer support structures between themselves.

2014-2015 ACHIEVEMENTS

The year was started off with an Organisational Development workshop in March to introduce organisations to the QIS programme. A status report was compiled to capture the progress of the different affiliates on each QIS cycle towards verification, and a QIS plan was formulated to give further momentum to the programme. In September, the Project Planning and Design module was successfully implemented with eight affiliate organisations, with excellent feedback on the quality of the training. As a first, we successfully combined mentoring and training so that participants were able to contextualise the project planning tools to their own organisations immediately. Five social workers who attended the training received 12 Professional Development points each from The South African Council for Social Service Profession.

In February 2015, a group-mentoring day was held to assist organisations to identify their organisational development gaps, and to help those who are on their way to verification to prepare their evidence. The standards of all six modules were revisited and a summary of evidence needed for each module's standards was given to participants. A total of 11 organisations attended this group-mentoring day and participants concluded the day with anticipation to improve the quality of how they function. The QIS programme has great momentum going forward and QIS participants share a strong sense of cohesion in their journey towards organisational excellence.

Technical support is a new service available via our network office. Many of our affiliates struggle with issues like compliance and budgeting, and already two affiliates received direct support in this regard in 2014. We have also embarked on a three-year process of laying a foundation for future collaborative (consortium) fundraising and reporting. In this regard we conducted a thorough baseline research to profile the Network, and this data will inform the 2016-2019-network strategy.



The Connect Network Small Grants is an initiative aimed at providing funds to affiliates who have committed to QIS, are actively involved in the network and have a child protection policy. In 2014 fifteen small grants were allocated totalling more than R 100,000, Grants included textbooks, repair and service of computer labs, educational materials for crèches, toilets for an educare Centre, a fridge for a nutrition programme, educational technology and coaching support.

protective_environments_for_ children

Our first objective was to build ten communitybased networks for the well-being of their children.

Our second objective was to engage and mobilise 20 churches to respond to the needs of the children at risk in their community.

Firstly, by the end of 2014 eight potential networks (or child care forums) were identified. Secondly, Arise Children's Ministries conducted research into designing a streamlined legal pathway to providing permanency of family care for children. Thirdly, more than 20 churches participated in child protection campaigns in their communities. Fourthly, three affiliates worked together to develop a Children's Act Manual for churches and presented it at the International Child-Safequardina Conference in September.



@improved_opportunities_for_ education

Our objectives were to ensure that 80% of early childhood development centres (ECD's) in the network were committed to comply with the Department of Social Development's legal requirements, and that 1,000 children between grades R to 12 access learner support through homework clubs.

By the end of 2014 50% of the Early Childhood Development centres achieved compliance and, of the remaining centres, 80% showed commitment to the process of compliance. More than 1,000 children had access to learner support through the various Homework clubs.

@resourceful and resilient mothers

Our objective here was to facilitate the networking of women-focused organisations so that at least half of them are engaged in and prepared for collaborating together.

By the end of 2014 all women-focused organisations were becoming well networked and had started working on joint initiatives.






